



2020 INTERVENTIONS

The year 2020 was unfeigned historic year. The pandemic dominated the international, national, state and community headlines and in perpendicular ways, changed lives. It was a year that most persons did not see it coming the way it did, an unimaginable one year. The news in the airways included many deaths, completes shot-down that lead to a melt of economic resources, uprising in Gender Based Violence especially in rape cases, increase in unemployment and hunger. People living in the communities were worst hit especially when the spread of COVID-19 became communal. Information of the spread was concentrated on electric, social and public press media, leaving out the vulnerable groups especially the Blind. While the world saw reasons to resign, CLHEI saw opportunities. Interventions around the vulnerable people became top, COVID 19 sensitization were carried out house to house, in communities, churches and some selected Local Government areas. In Benue State, a health emergency response team was constituted with some CSOs as members with various technical responsibilities shared to support government preventive and spreads mitigation drives. CLHEI is a member of the technical committee and also responsible for strategic communication in the year 2020, CLHEI activities and international days were celebrated, all these were accomplished through partnerships, Donors and the Board of trustees (BOT).

FUNDED PROJECTS

PROJECT NAME: PROVIDING IDP CAMPS WITH SOLAR-POWER AND FABRICATED COOKING STOVES AS ALTERNATIVE POWER SOURCE IN GUMA AND MAKURDI LGAS OF BENUE STATE

PROJECT AIM: The Project aimed at contributing in strengthening the resilience of the very vulnerable IDPs and families in the camps through the introduction and consolidation of access to and use of solar power and stoves.

PROJECT OBJECTIVE: To provide qualitative and quantitative evidence that solar power and stoves are viable and sustainable local power and cooking energy solutions in IDP camps, bringing

benefits especially for women living in the selected 6 camps that can be replicated and scaled up in other camps in the future

Output 1: 23-IDP households and families in camps provided with provided with solar lights both in Daudu 1 and Abagena camps

Output 2: 60 IDP households provided with energy cooking stoves.

Providing IDP Camps with Solar-power and fabricated cooking stoves as alternative Power source in Guma and Makurdi LGAs of Benue State is a ground-breaking project that brought about sanity, freedom of operation and safety among the IDPs in the two selected IDP camps.

The impact of the project brought about reduction of rape cases that was rampant in the camps especially at night when the whole camps were surrounded with darkness. There is also a huge reduction of open defecation around the camps at night.

The local fabricated stoves distributed among beneficiaries is promising to opportunities for the energy sector especially to enterprising displaced women who want to create lasting change.

A total number of 60 household were trained to make briquettes as energy for the stoves. Looking forward for it being a sustainable energy source that can empower women at the same time.

If urban centers were running out of resources, both human and materials, one would imagine what the rural settings and communities were facing or had faced.


This project gave health facilities some succor with personal Protection Equipment's (PPEs), Households were provided nonfood items and cash to cushion effect.





TRAINING OF 64 HEALTH WORKERS ON COVID 19 PROTOCOLS






TRAINING OF 240 COMMUNITY PROTECTION COMMITTEE ON GBV AND REFFERAL PATHWAYS










FUMIGATION OF 107 PLACES ACROSS THE 16 COMMUNITIES OF IMPLEMENTATION



CLHEI CHRISTMAS KITCHEN 2020

Community Links and Human Empowerment Initiative annual Christmas kitchen is one of the many ways the organization reaches out to the vulnerable groups in different locations where she shares with the selected persons food and non-food items. Since the inception of the organization this has been a practice to put smiles on faces of the less privileged to share together in the spirit of Christmas. 2020 annual Christmas kitchen was carried in three local governments, two in Benue state and one in Lafia, Nasarawa state with a total number of 1,613 persons reached in 2020.

CHRISTMAS KITCHEN LAFIA NASARAWA STATE.

CLHEI observed their annual Christmas kitchen in Tudun-Kauri in lafia, Nasarawa State, the beneficiaries from the Christmas Kitchen distribution were selected to cut across very vulnerable, pregnant, lactating mothers and aged women who had no good source of livelihood around the office community. The beneficiaries left with a pack containing bathing soap, body cream, a pack of sanitary pad, and CLHEI's branded hand sanitizers per individual, this created an avenue for the organization to sensitize women on SGBV and proper reporting channels where created. The organization was able to successfully carry out the distribution and training of 60 women in Lafia, Nasarawa State.

CHRISTMAS KITCHEN IN OBI LGA, BENUE STATE IN PARTNERSHIP WITH VICTIM SUPPORT FUND.

The second phase of the Christmas kitchen was carried out by Community Links and Human Empowerment Initiative (CLHEI) in Obi local government of Benue State with sustenance from Victims Support Funds (VSF). Obi Local Government Area is one of the two Igede speaking LGAs in Benue State, with her headquarter as Obarike-Ito. Obi LGA constitutes of 12 council wards (Obarike-Ito, Orihi, Okwutungbe, Ogore, Okpokwu, Odiapa, Obeko, Itogo, Irabi, Ikwokwu, Akum West and Adiko council ward) and is occupied by peasant farmers. The target beneficiaries in this distribution were earmarked to be widows, persons living with

disability, the aged, child headed households and the poorest. A total number of 329 households benefited from this activity, each household that met the criteria received groundnut oil, beans, maize, packs of salt and rice all packed in a 50kg bag.



EDUCATION IN EMERGENCY

In the last four (4) years, Community Links and Human Empowerment have been actively carrying out interventions in education, this is not secondary to its corporate efforts in Human Development. Resultantly, In the year 2020, Community Links and Human Empowerment Initiative in partnership with Kiek Foundation registered NECO/SSCE for 10 vulnerable girls on education in emergency for the 2019/2020 academic session for teenage girls who have been forced to flee their homes due to farmers/herders' conflict, such girls were identified across IDP camps and the host communities of gbajimba-Guma LGA of Benue State to register them for NECO/SSCE at Government Secondary School, Gbajimba, in Guma LGA of Benue State. However, the aim to reach out to 1000 IDP girls was cut short with the outbreak of COVID 19, and limited funds generated as a result, only 10 girls from the IDPs were registered, they took part in the NECO/SSCE 2019/2020 academic session and passed the exams successfully. Amidst our fears and panic on the contact and spread of the deadly corona virus, this vulnerable set of people seem to be neglected as no message have been directed to them considering their disability. This group by the organization were taught how to wash hands, provided and taught them how to use a face mask and sensitized them on the preventive and safety measures to observe and be safe.

The second visit to this community, National Association of the Blind (NAB) was in partnership and support of SESOR Empowerment Foundation and Mrs Yetunde Olowookere, friend and supporter of CLHEI, during the second visit with the partnership and support, both food and non-food items were donated to the blind in Gwer West, this

was aimed at cushioning the effect of hardship occasioned by the outbreak of the dreaded Covid 19 pandemic. The items donated got across all the 63 members of the association.

This provided a wonderful time for the IDP's to be celebrated and to putsmiles on their faces. The activity was graced with music and dancing as everyone danced to the rhythms of the music, after having fun, two sacks of 150kg full of clothes for children and adult and pairs of shoes were donated.



INTERNATIONAL DAY CELEBRATIONS WORLD LITERACY DAY CELEBRATION (8TH SEPTEMBER, 2020)

The World Literacy Day is a day set aside to remind the general public of the importance of literacy for individuals, communities and societies and the need to intensify efforts towards more literate societies. In respect to the World Literacy Day, the Organization carried out a visit to the IDP camp NEPA Quarters Northbank to celebrate with them and also create awareness on the importance of education, especially on the aspect of the parental involvement in a child's education as it is well known that the first school of a child begins at home. The organization was able to reach out to a total number of 20 person for this activity at the IDP camp.



INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PEACE (21ST OF SEPTEMBER, 2020)

The 2020 theme for the International Day of Peace is "SHAPING PEACE TOGETHER". The day is to be celebrated by sharing compassion, kindness and hope in the

face of the pandemic. The idea was to stand together with the UN against attempts to use the virus to promote discrimination or hatred. the day is also meant to unite and share ideas on how to weather this storm, heal our planet and change it for the better, even though we may not be able to stand next to each other, we can still dream together, on this note, the organization created a forum with all the six IDP camp chairmen and chairperson in Makurdi, Benue State to discuss, share experiences and foster ways to improve peace within the communities around Makurdi metropolis and Benue State at large. The activity has in attendance a total of 12 persons representing each IDP camp in Makurdi.

INTERNATIONAL DAY OF THE GIRL CHILD (11TH OCTOBER, 2020)

October 11th has been marked as the international day of the girl child, as the united nations designated this day to "support more opportunity for girls and increase the awareness of gender inequality faced by girls worldwide". The inequality includes areas such as right to education/access to education, nutrition, legal rights, medical care and protection from discrimination, violence against women and force child marriage.

This year, the theme of the international day of the girl child is "MY VOICE, OUR EQUAL FUTURE". To mark this year's celebration and efforts to make the world a better place for the girl child, Community Links and Human Empowerment Initiative joined in celebrating the girl child with PEACE ADOLESCENT GIRLS CLUB at NUJ House, Makurdi, Benue State. The program was aimed at primarily educating and empowering the girl child, the organization was able to reach out to 30 girl students within the various schools public secondary surrounding the area. CLHEI sensitized and educate the 30

participants on GBV and Gender based equality, participants were also trained on making hand sanitizer as medium to adhere to Covid'19 protocols and also as a source of empowerment.

The activity was carried out at chiventis plaza along modern market road, with 10 persons in attendance, the importance of handwashing was shared with the participants and all present demonstrated the best way to wash hands.







WORLD AIDS DAY (1ST DECEMBER, 2020)

Every year, on 1st December, the world commemorates World AIDS Day. People around the world unite to show support for people living with and affected by HIV and to remember those who lost their lives to AIDS. In 2020, the world's attention has been focused on COVID-19 pandemic and how the pandemic affect lives and livelihoods.

COVID-19 is showing once again how health is interlinked with other critical issues, such as reducing inequality, human rights, gender equality, social protection and economic growth. With this in mind, this year the theme of World AIDS Day is "Global solidarity, shared responsibility" (WHO) and "Ending the HIV/AIDS Epidemic through Resilience and Impact" (UN).

Team CLHEI was able to carry-out her planned activity for World Aids Day, 2020 with the IDPs in Baka camp, North-Bank Makurdi, with camp chairmen who represented their various camps. The team was able to sensitize 50 participants in the IDP camp on HIV and Aids prevention which included both men and women. More emphasis was directed towards stigma, discrimination, social injustice and fundamental human rights as regards persons living with HIV/AIDS. The ways in which the HIV can be contracted and the various preventive tips were clearly spelt out to participants.
